


Big challenges facing young citizens: IPCC Special report on 1.5 global warming:




















What should be the main characteristics of Education for Environmental Citizenship?

It depends.....What do we want to achieve?

ENEC: knowledge, skills, values, attitudes & competences to participate as an agent of change in private/public spheres, at multiple scales collectively/individually to address environmental problems, prevent new ones, advance sustainability & healthy relationship with nature. (Avoiding Freire's Banking model of education?)

ENEC: to empower citizens to exercise environmental rights and duties & identify underlying structural causes of environmental degradation competences for critical and active engagement and civic participation for democratic & inter/intragenerational justice (Building on Freire's Liberation learning: problem posing+ connection+reflection=awareness conscientization /conscientização)


